




Friedrich Ani Last Respects

No one said anything, no one saw anything

Seventeen-year-old Finja Madsen fails to come home after a party one night. There are no witnesses, no clues as to what happened to her. The investigation is at a dead end. Inspector Fariza Nasri interviews family and friends of the missing girl, including her mother's boyfriend Stephan Barig. The party was at his house while he spent the weekend in the countryside with two friends. Barig diligently cooperates. Nasri listens, asks questions – and is suddenly certain that the man is lying. But was he really involved in Finja's disappearance or is he hiding something else entirely?

Friedrich Ani was born in 1959. His first novel was published in 1996, and since then he has gone on to write crime novels, poetry and YA-fiction, as well as writing for TV, radio and theatre. His books have received many prominent awards, among them the Bavarian Cultural Ministry's Advancement Award for Literature and the German Crime Fiction Prize. So far, he is the only author ever to receive the German Crime Fiction Prize for three titles in the same year.



They refuse to seek shelter in the cellar and wait it out in the dark, draughty art gallery, defying the cold and the hunger. Mojsej, 25, and Antonina, 37, work at Leningrad's Hermitage, one of the most beautiful museums of fine arts in the world. In the winter of 1941/42, it becomes their last refuge. In the beginning, they recite poetry, tell each other the fairy tale of the Snow Queen, re-enact paintings by Rembrandt that are supposed to be evacuated from the museum. When they try to remember a song, their voices fail. Listening into the silence, the repeated calling, ensuring that the other is still there, the conversations between two lovers, reduced to rudimentary fragments, ultimately turn out to be a »documentation of voices« of authentic figures who died during the siege of Leningrad.

This focal text of the volume, preceded by ten longer and shorter pieces of prose, is entitled *Living Images*. All of them revolve around Saint Petersburg as an imaginary place, even when they are set in Lowell/ Massachusetts, in San Francisco or by a stream in Siberia and deal with childhood, first love or painful losses.

Polina Barskova's poetic language calls us, through space and time, as witnesses to the scenes and inserts every experience into the larger context of history. By attempting to interweave private recollections and cultural memory, she defies traditional narrative forms – not programmatically but based on an existential experience.







Ulrike Edschmid Levy's Testament

They meet in Berlin but in London they become a couple. They spend their days in a court room at the Old Bailey, to support anarchists facing draconian prison sentences. Strikes, squatting, IRA attacks and the tough measures taken by the government shape everyday life in the winter of 1972. The couple explore the city, floating through it weightlessly as though in a dream. The Englishman (as the narrator calls her companion) knows little about his Jewish family. Decades later, after they have already been separated for many years, the Englishman uncovers a family drama. It takes him back to the Old Bailey: to 1924, to a spectacular fraud case, in which the accused is Levy, his great-grandfather.

Following the restless search of her companion, encouraging it with her questions, the narrator stumbles upon the inscrutable workings of history, which connects the remotest episodes of our life. Their quiet, prosaic, adamant sound is what makes Ulrike Edschmid's novels unique. In *Levy's Testament* the lover turns into a chronicler and the intimacy of emotion into an instrument of cognizance.





Peter Handke My Day in the Other Country

»There is a story in my life that I have never told anyone.«

His surroundings see him as a man possessed, »possessed not just by one, but by several, many, even countless demons«. During the day, he, a fruit grower by profession, walks through the village. Quietly he speaks in tongues, a non-existent language, scares the villagers with insults and abuse, with prophesies. Only his sister stands by him, their parents died a long time ago. She observes him talking to other living beings, animals, and refuses to acknowledge that he sings with the voice of an angel. She follows him, to the lake »with the other country at the opposite bank« - that's where a man looks at him like »he has never been looked at by anyone before« and that's when the demons leave his body. After that, he sets out »after a long-drawn-out goodbye, of course, on the journey to the other country across the lake«.

Peter Handke writes about demons that lose their scariness through the gaze of the one who says: »There you are again, my friend!« In that very moment in which the possessed is as he was. He talks about a poetic transformation, a liberation that retains the »ineradicable resistance« aside from the harmonies; for: »Nothing becomes without it. Without it there is nothing but being, being there, and perpetually inanimate existence.«

Industrial snow marks the village limits, a subtle acidity is in the air, and behind the bridge whirrs the production hall where the father pickles aluminium sheets day in, day out. This is where the first-person narrator grew up, this is where she returns to when her childhood friends get married. And while she walks the familiar paths, she remembers: the father and the blind grandfather who barely talk, don't want any change and are unable to throw anything away to the point where not just the personal chattels but also the suppressed memories bulge out. Memories of the mother, whose desire for freedom was suffocating in the constraints of a West-German working class flat until she packed her bags in a burst of rebellion and left her daughter with her drinking father. Memories of leaving school early and the effort of making up what she had missed in a second attempt, of the shame and the fear - first of not passing, then of being put back in her place as someone who had climbed.

Sky Glow tells a story of class and origin without pithy slogans, of discrimination and contempt and their effects on the individual. 





Annette Dufner Whose Life Should We Save?

How should resources such as donor organs be distributed among patients on the waiting list? Who should receive a ventilator during the pandemic, if there are more patients than intensive care unit beds? This book addresses recent approaches to distributive justice under conditions of scarcity. In scenarios in which not everybody in need can receive help there is often a tension between efficiency and fairness. For example, aiming at an efficient use of scarce donor organs can imply having to exclude patients who are particularly sick and therefore have lower chances of long-term benefit. Annette Dufner shows how these contradicting criteria can be reconciled in concrete cases, and what such a position would imply for the distribution of donor organs through the Eurotransplant algorithm as well as for the distribution of scarce ventilators during a pandemic.

A contribution to the difficult ethical problem of how one should act when one is faced with numerous persons requiring urgent care but is only able to help some of them due to a scarcity of resources.



Isabell Lorey Democracy in the Present Tense

A Theory of the Political Present

Amidst the crises and threats to liberal democracy, Isabell Lorey develops a democracy in the political present that bursts open political certainties as well as linear ideas about progress and growth. With her queer-feminist political theory she formulates a fundamental criticism of masculinist conceptions of the people, representation, institution and multitude. And she develops an original concept of presentist democracy that is based on care and connectedness, on the irreducibility of responsibilities - and that is unthinkable without past struggles and current practices of social movement. When queer-feminist care practices and a black and queer understanding of debt are foregrounded, democracy emerges in present tense.

Democracy in the Present Tense is a radical intervention into the masculinist political theory of liberal democracy where bourgeois ideas of time are confronted with a new conception of the present. With reference to the political philosophy of thinkers such as Rousseau, Derrida, Benjamin, Foucault and Negri and practices of contemporary social movements a queer-feminist form of presentist democracy develops, which proceeds from care and connectedness.



For Ole Nymoen and Wolfgang M. Schmitt influencers are the symptomatic social figures of our times. But according to Nyomen and Schmitt, influencers impact on the zeitgeist in another regard in spite of all their purported modernness: By propagating reactionary role models, consumerism and rigid body ideals, they are aiding and abetting a conservative backlash.


Gerhard Roth On Humanity

Mankind - from the perspective of a neuroscientist

Hardly any other field of research has undergone developments as turbulent as those within neuroscience. At the same time, the field has become the topic of fierce interdisciplinary debates that predominantly revolve around one single question: Are neuroscientific findings forcing us to revise our established conception of man?

Hedwig Richter Towards Modernity

»In order to understand the present, we must understand the reform era around 1900 in its complexity.«

The German Empire, founded in 1871, is often considered a stronghold of subservience to authority, chauvinism and militarism. Yet, at the same time, it was a point of departure towards modern mass democracy. The Empire had an intelligent constitution, ambitious reforms were initiated, and one of the biggest changes of all was gaining crucial momentum: women's liberation.

These tendencies, according to Hedwig Richter, are not mere asynchronisms. The inclusion of the masses, propelled by the idea of equality, came at the cost of various exclusions: antisemitism, racism or misogyny. In her essay, Richter shows that we can understand the 20th century and its extremes better if we understand the reform era around 1900 in its complexity.

Most social spheres are today characterized by networks. For a long time, an ethos of connectivity has dominated: the more connections the better! However, today this euphoria for connectedness has lost its appeal. Our constant availability is demanding its price, open-plan offices face increasing criticism and new security risks cause concerns. Based on analyses of such crises of hyperconnectivity, Urs Stäheli ponders the limits of connectedness from three different angles - as a criticism of relational social theories, as a culturalsociological analysis of the figures of disconnection and as a genealogy of the practices of disconnecting in different fields.






Wolfgang Streeck Between Globalism and Democracy

What comes after neoliberalism? – The much-anticipated sequel to the international success *Buying Time*

In the heyday of neoliberalism globalisation was considered inevitable and redistributive democracy obsolete. The promise was prosperity for all, the result was growing inequality. Economic stagnation coincided with a worldwide crisis of confidence in democratic institutions, including established political parties and trade unions. New movements like the »yellow vests« and newly formed parties at the margins of the political spectrum emerged in protest of declining political protection against rapidly rising economic and social uncertainty.

In his brilliant new book, Wolfgang Streeck argues that in light of this situation, whose causes appear all the more pronounced due to the Corona pandemic, it is time to make a fundamental decision. Should the reorganisation of the state system continue as before, i.e. towards ever greater supranational centralisation? Or would a rebuilding of decentralized autonomy and sovereignty - a return to more democratic self-government on the ground - be a better answer? In the book Streeck explores the limits of technocratic or free-market centralization within and between states and the possibilities of democratic decentralization as a response to the crises of our time, especially in Europe.

A year in the in-between of time

1977 saw the Red Army Faction start its »Offensive 77«, the opening of the Centre Pompidou in Paris, the launch of Apple II in California – and the invention of the internet. What do these strange simultaneities mean? Why was Jimmy Carter talking about »human rights«, were civil rights activists talking about »identity politics«, esoterics about »New Age« and architects about »symbolic forms« simultaneously? Why punk, disco and hip-hop at the same time? And why did Michel Foucault say in 1977: »We must go back to the very beginning.«?

In his book, Philipp Sarasin examines the lines, patterns and similarities that connect these and other events of 1977 with one another – and he shows how the belief in a commonality, which had shaped modernity, began to crumble. *1977* shows us a year in which only uncertainty was certain while the notion prevailed that the old coordinates of the industrial society would no longer be offering any guidance in the future. Minsk, summer 2020. A young woman in a sleeveless shirt dances along a black wall of special forces clad in black: Images like this one were seen the world over. Hundreds of thousands of courageous citizens from all social stratums are opposing the brutality of the regime with non-violence, creative diversity and decentralised self-organisation.

The events that have been unfolding in Belarus since the presidential elections on August 9, 2020, are far more than a regional protest movement against election fraud. History is being made in Minsk and many other cities of this widely unknown country situated between the EU and Russia. Priya Basil In Us and Now »What is feminist?«

»What is feminist? It confronts me more and more often, this question. I accumulate definitions, work out different interpretations, linger at various intersections. But the question persists: what is feminist? I switch between positions, stumble through contradictions, cling to my fictions. What is feminist? I have a hundred answers or none, because I cannot hold to only one.«

Priya Basil grows up in Nairobi as the daughter of Indian immigrants. There, as in much of the world, a conservative, patriarchal value system determines what to do and what not. Women find different ways of arranging themselves. Priva's grandmother is loud, flamboyant, assertive, while her daughter, Priya's mother, is quiet, obedient, accommodating. Priva herself is sent to study at the best schools in England. She begins to search for another way, moves to Berlin, takes on the role of author and human rights activist, eschews motherhood and seeks new forms of kinship, of belonging. Yet, she finds, whatever you do, it's hard to slip the heavy heritage of gender expectations and her questions are getting louder: what can be done against misogyny and the deeply entrenched devaluation of women in our language, economy, history and society? With the help of many disciplines, with the help of many allies, Priya Basil formulates an answer: Becoming Feminist, In Us and Now.

Living on two different continents is always a big challenge for a family, in times of a pandemic, however, the challenge becomes almost insurmountable. This experience is one the German grandmother shares with millions of other families around the world.

The personal impressions and observations are complemented by flashbacks of the author's career in international book trade. Why were the business trips to Beijing, Beirut and Kolkata so easy to manage while life in California is not? An entertaining and stimulating book about different ways of living and working in the age of globalism.


